① With the help of the phrase "It takes..." you can express how much time you need for something. You always start the sentence with "It takes" which is then followed by an object, a time expression and the infinitive with to. For example: It takes me half an hour to do my homework.

Present	Simp	le:

Positive: It takes him ten minutes to go to school.

Negative: It doesn't take him ten minutes to go to school. Question: Does it take him ten minutes to go to school?

Past Simple:

Positive: It took him ten minutes to go to school.

Negative: It didn't take him ten minutes to go to school. Question: Did it take him ten minutes to go to school?

Will-Future:

Positive: It will take him ten minutes to go to school. Negative: It won't take him ten minutes to go to school. Question: Will it take him ten minutes to go to school?
